It Takes a Community to Raise a Village

As we reported in a previous issue of BeaverTales, there were two new cedar staff cabins erected in 2017 (shown below). These cabins are used by summer staff and can be rented in other seasons. Each cabin has been equipped with two sets of bunks to sleep four persons in each cabin.

These cabins are part of the children's camp facility renewal programme being funded by a grant from part of the proceeds from the sale of Camp Bitobi—a much loved older Christian camp located across the river in Gracefield which has continued life as Camp Misquah—a summer camp for individuals with special needs.

In addition to these staff accommodations, a new Family Cabin Village is currently being planned which will include five individual cabins for rent. This village is tentatively being planned to be located along the lake between Second Beach and the Manager's Cottage. There will be two cabins 10x16ft, three cabins 10x12ft, and two outhouses similar to the one already located at Second Beach. Each cabin will be equipped with two sets of bunks—one twin size, one with a lower double, to sleep 4-5 persons in each cabin.

The cabin village is being built with a portion of the grant received as the Erskine Legacy after the closure of Erskine Presbyterian Church in Ottawa. The Erskine congregation were long-time supporters of Christian camping and we are pleased to see their legacy continue at Gracefield.

All the cabins and outhouses for these projects are being built and installed by Kaza Cabana, a local cedar manufacturing business located on highway 105 in Kazabazua. It is worth noting that the founder's daughter was a camper at Gracefield in the 1990s.

Cabin Fever!

This spring, the Property Committee will be working to rejuvenate a long-standing tradition at Gracefield of 'adopting a cabin'. This was something that Brian Ham in his time as Camp Co-Director had 'a fever' for (actually it was more like passion and a vision) and something that has been very well supported by some congregations past and present, most recently by Knox Manotick.

In partnership with Bruce Howard, the plan will be to create a standard design for the cabin structures and their features as well as a planned maintenance/ rejuvenation program. Coupled to this will be a structured stewardship program that will permit congregations, individuals and other benefactors to contribute time, talent, treasure—or a combination of all three—to a cabin or cabins of their choice.

The goal is to ensure all of the cabins provide a safe and welcoming 'home away from home' and to enhance the camp experience and contribute to cherished memories of Gracefield. A sub-committee is currently being formed and its work will start with getting input from cabin adopters and volunteers past and present and finding out what works, what doesn't and just as important, what inspires them to contribute in this way.
